Briefly outline how the potential proposal aligns with the principles under section 26 of the *Local Government Act 1999.*

The following principles must be addressed in your potential proposal:

- 1. Proposed changes should, wherever practicable, benefit ratepayers
- 2. A council should offer its community a reasonable range of services delivered on an efficient, flexible, equitable and responsive basis
- 3. A council should reflect communities of interest of an economic, recreational, social, regional or other kind, and be consistent with community structures, values, expectations and aspirations
- 4. A council area should incorporate or promote an accessible centre (or centre) for local administration and services



You may wish to address other Section 26 principles as part of your Potential Proposal – however this is optional. The Section 26 Principles are Attachment 1 of Guideline 6.

The Section 26 Principles are of fundamental importance to boundary change proposals and ultimately form the basis of any recommendation the Boundaries Commission makes to the Minister.
